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Introduction

sportscotland is the national agency for sport and has a clear focus on developing and supporting a world class sporting system in Scotland. We are a non-departmental public body (NDPB), responsible through ministers to the Scottish Parliament, managing Scottish Government and National Lottery resources, continually striving to ensure these resources are invested efficiently so as to achieve best value and maximum impact.

This procurement annual report covers the whole of operations of the **sport**scotland group, which comprises of **sport**scotland (inclusive of National Lottery funding distribution) and the Scottish Sports Council Trust Company, which operates two national centres in Scotland.

As a public sector contracting authority, **sport**scotland is subject to the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014 and as such is required to publish an annual report on our regulated procurement activities. A regulated procurement is any procurement for public supplies or services with a value of over £50,000 and for public works with a value of over £2,000,000. **sport**scotland champions the Scottish Procurement Model through embedding sustainable procurement. The report provides detail on **sport**scotland procurement activity in relation to the **sport**scotland Procurement Strategy. As required by the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014, the <u>sportscotland Procurement Strategy</u> was published in November 2016 and is reviewed annually.

The Procurement Strategy is set within the context of **sport**scotland's corporate strategy Sport for Life which sets out the following:

Vision: Our vision is for an active Scotland where everyone benefits from sport.

Mission: Our mission is to help the people of Scotland get the most from the sporting system.

Summary of Regulated Procurements Completed

The Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014 requires an annual procurement report to include a summary of the regulated procurements that have been completed during the period covered by the report.

During the period 1st April 2023 to 31st March 2024, **sport**scotland awarded four regulated contracts (2022-23: eight) to a total sum of £944,711 (2022-23: £1,438,909). All procurements complied with the **sport**scotland Procurement Strategy.

Details of the four contracts awarded that meet Regulation Procurement definition in 2023/24 are provided in the table below:

Section 3

Review of Regulated Procurement Compliance

The Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014 requires an annual report to include a review of whether the regulated procurements complied with the authority's procurement strategy.

sportscotland's procurement strategy requires all tenders over £15,000 (£30,000 as of 1 January 2024) to follow a competitive tender exercise. During the period covered by this annual report, **sport**scotland awarded nine contracts (2022-23: eleven) through competitive tendering, all of which complied with the **sport**scotland procurement strategy.

Four of these contracts, as listed in Section 2, were regulated with all complying with **sport**scotland's procurement strategy.

To ensure continued compliance, all **sport**scotland staff with delegated purchasing authority and all new employees, are required to complete Procurement e-learning training. Between January and February 2024, Finance & Procurement delivered refresher training to all individuals (approx. 150) with purchasing authority within **sport**scotland.

Community Benefit Summary

As part of the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014, where the estimated value of a contract is equal to or greater than £4,000,000, **sport**scotland has a duty to consider whether to impose community benefit requirements.

During the period of the report, **sport**scotland had no contracts greater than £4,000,000 therefore no community benefit requirements were imposed as part of the regulated procurements delivered. However, both of **sport**scotland's national centers continue to provide benefits to the local community. Below is table showing examples by National Center, some examples as below:

Contracts with Small, Medium Enterprises (SMEs)

One of the priorities of both the Public Contracts (Scotland) Regulations 2015 and Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014, is to improve access to public sector contracts, particularly for SMEs and **sport**scotland's policy is to encourage participation by SMEs. SMEs are most commonly defined as firms employing less than 250 people.

During the period covered by the annual report 2 out of 4 contractors awarded regulated procurements in Section 2 were SMEs. Overall, 70% of **sport**scotland annual procurement spend was awarded to SMEs.

Section 8

Fair Working Practices and Climate Emergency

Fair Work First

sportscotland is a Scottish Living Wage supporter and as such is considerate of Fair Working Practices in employment when entering into any contract with suppliers.

Where relevant and proportionate to do so, **sport**scotland is embedding Fair Work First criteria in new procurements. Fair Work First is incorporated into all regulated contracts awarded during the period of this report. Fair Work First considerations included in tender submissions are monitored through contract management throughout the duration of the contracts.

Climate Emergency

sportscotland has included its commitment to climate and the circular economy in its Procurement Strategy. Climate and the circular economy is considered in all new procurement and savings have started to be reported in this area. Environmental impact will continue to be monitored though our contract management process.

Section 9

Procurement Savings

Where a requirement can be met and value for money achieved through the use of an existing contract put in place by the Scottish Procurement and Property Directorate or another collaborative procurement agency such as Crown Commercial Service, **sport**scotland's policy is to utilise these contracts.

During the period, **sport**scotland awarded the total of £991,333.85 in call-offs through Public Frameworks including Scottish Government, Crown Commercial Service and others with a total saving value of £294,245.22.

sportscotland spent £379,922.39 through Scottish Government Frameworks, resulting in savings of £175,473.00. **sport**scotland also spent £611,411.46 with Crown Commercial Service, NHS and other Frameworks realising total savings of £171,023.16.

In addition, savings of £29,977 were realised through locally procured category C contracts (total award value of £944,711).
