

Foreword

In September 2000, CHILDREN 1ST and sportscotland organised a Consultation Seminar entitled Children: Safe and Secure in Sport. Participating sporting organisations emphasised their need for advice and guidance on how to protect children taking part in the physical activities offered by them.

The Child Protection in Sport Steering Group has listened to these concerns and with the advice and assistance of a number of agencies, has produced this Action Plan for the protection of children taking part in sport in Scotland.

The Action Plan represents our commitment to work together across Scotland to ensure that all organisations, offering sporting opportunities to children, do so in a manner that supports and protects children. It is based on the basic principles that children of all ages should be protected from harm and their rights and interests promoted.

The physical, emotional and social benefits to children who participate in sport are well recognised. Sport also provides support to children whose lives are affected by abuse, poverty, domestic violence, drug or alcohol misuse or the consequences of offending. The Steering Group hopes that all member organisations, who provide sporting opportunities to children, will sign up to the Action Plan to ensure that every child who takes part in sport does so in a safe and fun environment.
